A Message From Your Pastors

Hearts of Gratitude

⁴I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, ⁵for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind—⁶just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you—⁷so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁸He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. As the timeline was being reviewed and stories were being shared, people began to applaud. There was a such a strong sense of gratitude for all that St. John's has been throughout its history. As Paul writes above to the church in Corinth, we too can surely affirm that grace, enrichment in faith, strong testimonies, and every spiritual gift has been given to the fellowship of Jesus that is St. John's. God has called us all to be part of this fellowship, and God is faithful.

The visioning process has begun, and we can give thanks to God for all those who are able to participate in the events. We give thanks to God for the wonder, enthusiasm, and gratitude that is in the air as people share their stories of faith. We give thanks to God for all those who are holding this visioning process in prayer. We give thanks to God for the many hearts that beat with love as we discover the best path for the future of St. John's. November is Stewardship Month

November Emphasis on Stewardship: Frequently Asked Questions About Tithing

Q. What is biblical tithing?

A. In general, biblical tithing refers to the practice of giving one tenth of one's income for the work of God. In the Hebrew Bible, tithing was understood as a response of gratitude and an obligation. In the light of the New Testament, some Christians believe tithing is still an obligation, whereas other Christians understand tithing to be a loving, freely chosen response to God's gracious provisions for life - God's grace! Tithing is understood by many Christians to be an important discipline of one's faith life.

Q. What are some of the most important Old Testament references to tithing? A. Yes, there are several examples:

- "... and this stone, which I have set up for a pillar, shall be God's house; And of that you give me I will surely give one tenth to you." *Genesis 28:22*
- "All tithes from the land, whether the seed from the ground or the fruit from the tree, Are the Lord's; they are holy to the Lord." *Leviticus 27:30*
- "Set apart a tithe of all the yield of your seed that is brought in yearly from the field." Deuteronomy 14:22
- "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts: see if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessings." *Malachi 3:10*

Q. How does the New Testament deal with the opportunity to tithe?

A. We understand that Jesus and the apostles assumed that the tithe was a healthy guide for one's personal stewardship. In *Matthew 23:23* Jesus warns the scribes and Pharisees not to misuse the tithe as an 'excuse'; for neglecting other weightier matters of justice, mercy and faith. St. Paul follows the same logic in emphasizing that believers should give proportionately, as God has blessed them.

In 2 Corinthians 8 & 9, Paul describes the example the Macedonians set for other believers. In 2 Corinthians 8:2-3, Paul says directly "for during a severe ordeal of affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means."

Looking at verse 12, Paul instructs the Corinthians that they had something very important to learn from the Macedonians. It could be paraphrased like this: "It doesn't matter how much you have. What matters is how much you are willing to give from what you have." This is point of being faithful and generous!

Q. When one tithes, is the tithe on gross or net income?

A. There is no definitive answer to this question. One must choose the method that most adequately fulfills the intention of the person or household who tithes. It has been reported that many persons who file income tax returns use their Adjusted Gross Income as the base figure. This decision is clearly in the hands of the giver, and it is the faithful giver who responds generously.

Grace Notes



In the liturgical calendar, the first weekend in November is observed as All Saints Day. In the secular calendar, it's the weekend that daylight savings time comes to an end, and we return to standard time. I must say that I enjoy the extra hour of sleep and the delight of the morning sun arriving an hour earlier. But by late afternoon, my elation over the glorious morning begins to wane as the sun begins to set and darkness arrives.

As days shorten and daylight hours diminish, we soon find ourselves in the season of Advent where the themes of light and darkness are front and center. As I write this article, I am reminded of the darkness that seems to be overwhelming the world in which we live. A war in Ukraine, conflicts between Israel and Palestine, earthquakes in Afghanistan, wildfires, tornados, hurricanes, gun violence and mass shootings continue to fill the headlines of our daily news. Yet during the Advent season, we are reminded that light emerges from the darkness as we prepare for the coming of Christ. During this season we hear the words of the prophet Isaiah who declared that "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined." (Isaiah 9:2)

As we prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth, the season becomes magical as candles shine, glitter sparkles, and twinkling lights appear. Even snow can bring a beautiful light into the darkest part of the year. In our worship services during the four weeks of Advent, we light the candles of the Advent wreath to symbolize a contrast between darkness and light. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding the Lord's coming into the world. Each week, one more candle is lit, gradually dispelling more and more of the darkness as we draw ever closer to the time of Christ's birth.

As the candles of the Advent wreath are lit during our worship services this year, we will be singing a simple Yiddish tune with words that celebrate the coming of light. "Light One Candle to Watch for Messiah" (ELW #240) was composed almost forty years ago and includes a constant refrain of "watch for Messiah; let the light banish darkness." As an additional candle is lit each week, another verse of the song will be sung, until by the fourth week all four candles are burning and all four verses of the hymn are sung. The first two verses tell about what God in Christ will do: "He will bring salvation," "feed the flock," and "gently lead them homeward." Verses 3 and 4 call us to action: "Lift up your heads and lift high the gateway," "tell the glad tidings," and "let your lights be shining."

Advent is the start of the church year and the beginning of the liturgical cycle of light. Through Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany, appropriately set in the darkest days of the year, we are called to remember that Jesus is the light of the world. It's a story that begins in darkness and will end in resurrection light. A baby is coming, the darkness recedes, and all will be well. In every moment of this season, may each of us send sparks of light into the darkness, reflecting and shining God's love and light into the world. Blessings for a wonderful Advent season!






PARKING FOR CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICES


